A bone mineral density screening programme at the Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital Trauma Centre on February 1 attracted 62 patients.

Blood donation drives

The Rotary International Global Hospital Blood Bank collected 780 units internally and 890 units at five blood donation programmes, from 1670 donors. Against this, 655 patients were served. One in four of the 1570 blood and blood components units issued



was given for free. The Thalassemia Day Care Centre attached to the blood bank consumed 14% units, the Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital Trauma Centre consumed 9% and the remaining units were consumed externally.

Sponsorship of Community Service Project

NewSpace India Limited has committed to sponsor the provisioning of health consultations to 50,000 socio-economically deprived village people through a mobile clinic. The project timeline is 18 months starting from April 1. Identifying tuberculosis patients and hand-holding them through the treatment regimen is also a part of this project. Medicine for these patients will be sourced from the government. Eye screening will be organised to identify people in need of cataract surgery. Such patients will be operated on free of charge to ensure that their ability to earn a livelihood and quality of life aren't compromised. Also, effort will be made to increase the community's



awareness of communicable and non-communicable diseases and health-promoting lifestyles.

Cataract screening programmes in Jalore



Fifteen eye screening events in Jalore and one in the neighbouring district Barmer attracted 2871 people for checks; 836 had their vision tested, 423 were dispensed glasses and 424 were found to have cataract. Of these walk-ins, 1060 were male and 1811 were female. Eventually, 330 patients underwent cataract surgery for no charges.
